Buck McNair Norman L. R. Franks, 2001 Robert Buck McNair came from Nova Scotia the second of three sons born of a mix of Scottish and German parents As a young man he became interested in flight and was lucky enough to be able to fly floatplanes off the Canadian lakes When war came he went through flight training in Canada sailed to England and in the summer of 1941 found himself with the newly formed 411 Squadron RCAF Eventually this unit began flying sweeps over Northern France and he saw his first combat actions during that autumn An aggressive fighter pilot he was chosen by his Canadian CO to accompany him to the besieged island of Malta in the spring of 1942 to coincide with the arrival on that island of the first Spitfires Almost before he found his feet he was nearly killed in a bombing raid In wartime Malta there was no chance to recuperate and he had to continue flying which he did with distinction gaining a number of victories and winning his first DFC Returning to England later in 1942 he saw action over Dieppe in August and became a flight commander After a break in Canada he took command of 421 Squadron RCAF in the summer of 1943 leading his pilots in many sorties over France and gaining more victories and two more DFCs Finally as a wing leader in early 1944 his leadership brought him the DSO However he had been injured on one sortie which forced him to bale out of a burning Spitfire and he was taken off operations shortly before D Day His score of victories however had reached 16 with others probably destroyed and damaged After the war he continued in the RCAF at home and abroad In 1953 he was a passenger in a North Star aeroplane which crashed at Vancouver airport and his bravery in helping extricate those on board resulted in the Queen s Commendation for Brave Conduct Later he commanded No 4 Canadian Wing in Germany and continued to fly fast jets In the last years of his life it was discovered that he had contracted leukaemia through treatment to help with an injured back the result of two war time bale outs However he continued in the service his final posting being to the Canadian Embassy in London until his untimely death in early 1971 This is a remarkable story of courage and heroism by one of the Second World War s top scoring fighter pilots who inspired his men and fellow pilots in actions above the skies of France and Malta and who despite being almost blind in one eye continued to lead and spur his men onto greater actions *Faces of HMS Royal Oak* Dilip Sarkar, 2023-12-30 On 14 October each year a White Ensign is placed on the stern of an upturned warship by Royal Navy divers This act commemorates the 835 men of HMS Royal Oak who died in 1939 when the battleship was sunk at anchor in Scapa Flow by the German U boat U 47 The sinking of the veteran First World War Revenge class Royal Oak shocked not only the Admiralty but the whole nation Though Scapa Flow was far from being impregnable as a base for the Royal Navy s Home Fleet it was surrounded by a ring of islands separated by shallow channels subject to fast racing tides While it was recognized that it was not impervious to enemy submarines measures had been put in place to minimize any such threat Blockships had been sunk at potentially vulnerable points and anti submarine booms deployed across the wider channels The outbreak of war in September 1939 saw additional anti submarine measures put in hand Despite these

increased precautions German aerial reconnaissance had spotted weaknesses which were exploited on the night of 13 14 October 1939 by Kapit nleutnant G nther Prien in U 47 The German submarine was able to slip into Scapa Flow undetected and fire three torpedoes towards Royal Oak Only one torpedo found its mark A second salvo was fired and this time all three hit the battleship igniting a magazine causing massive damage Within thirteen minutes HMS Royal Oak had turned over and sank In Faces of HMS Royal Oak Dilip Sarkar not only reveals the tragic and moving stories of many of those who died but also some of the 399 who survived the sinking of the first Royal Navy battleship lost in the Second World War Through their photographs and in some cases words the horrors of those fateful few minutes as Royal Oak rolled and slid into the cold dark waters of Scapa Flow are relived in startling clarity *Battle of Britain Daylight Defeat* Dilip Sarkar,2025-07-10 Sarkar s sixth volume examines the fourth phase of the Battle of Britain detailing Luftwaffe failures and Britain s resilience In this the sixth of Dilip Sarkar s unprecedented eight volume series the day by day events occurring in the fourth phase of the Battle of Britain are chronicled and set within a much wide context including the operations of Bomber and Coastal Commands and the Home Front Renowned for his evidence based approach the author has returned to primary sources the analysis arising often challenging our previous understanding and the popular narrative In Volume 5 Target London 7 September 1940 17 September 1940 the beginning of the Blitz was explored at length This illuminated the inescapable fact that Luftwaffe air intelligence completely failed to understand how Fighter Command was organised and controlled nor that it was replacement pilots not aircraft that was Air Chief Marshal Dowding s greatest concern Indeed on 15 September 1940 Luftwaffe aircrews were briefed to expect but a token resistance over London from the last handful of RAF fighters their morale shattered when their first attack was met by over 300 the second by nearly as many This convinced Hitler that the Luftwaffe could not achieve the aerial superiority needed for the invasion of Britain to proceed Two days later Operation Seel we was postponed indefinitely Reichsmarschall Herman G ring however still believed that the Luftwaffe could prevail and so continued attacking the UK changing tack yet again As London had proved it could take it the Luftwaffe whilst continuing to bomb the capital by night now focussed its daylight attacks on the British aircraft industry Naturally the Supermarine Spitfire factory at Southampton was a primary target it was subsequently badly hit with great loss of life Other factories in the West Country were also targeted and owing to a navigation error due to cloud cover the picturesque town of Sherborne was devastated on 30 September 1940 By that date however it was clear that G ring s He 111 force was unable to continue absorbing such losses and the type was exclusively switched to night bombing thereby substantially reducing the German daylight bombing force On 20 September 1940 Me 109 fighter bombers attacked London and going forward the next and final phase would see such attacks and high flying fighter sweeps dominate the daytime arena Such raids though were never going to defeat Britain so it is fair to say that the period reviewed in this volume really did see the Daylight defeat of the Luftwaffe over England in 1940 and the events involved are interpreted and recounted in great detail **Johnnie Johnson's Great Adventure** SARKAR

MBE DILIP,2022-05-30 Air Vice Marshal Johnnie Johnson a policeman s son from Leicestershire ended the Second World War as the RAF s top scoring fighter pilot Fearless and an exceptional pilot and marksman Johnnie was also highly intelligent and a gifted writer Having published two of his own books Wing Leader and The Circle of Air Fighting during the 1980s and 1990s Johnnie co authored several more with another fighter ace namely Wing Commander P B Laddie Lucas In 1997 the AVM suggested to his friend the prolific author Dilip Sarkar that the pair should collaborate on The Great Adventure a book that would in effect be Johnnie s account of the Long Trek from Normandy across Northern Europe into the heart of the Third Reich itself Greycap Leader was to produce a draft after which Dilip would add the historical detail and comment Sadly the project was unfulfilled because Johnnie became ill and passed away aged eighty five in 2001 Years later Johnnie s eldest son Chris discovered the manuscript among his august father s papers In order to keep Johnnie s memory evergreen Chris naturally turned to Dilip to finally see the project through to its natural conclusion In this book Johnnie re visits certain aspects of his wartime service including the development of tactical air cooperation with ground forces his time as a Canadian wing leader in 1943 when the Spitfire Mk IX at last outclassed the Fw 190 and details his involvement in some of the most important battles of the defeat of Nazi Germany including Operation Overlord and the D Day landings in 1944 Operation Market Garden and the airborne assault at Arnhem and the Rhine Crossings throughout all of which Johnnie also commanded Canadian wings Here then we have The Great Adventure Greycap Leader s previously unpublished last look back

*Screen Dilip Sarkar,2023-03-23* During the Second World War the British movie industry produced a number of films concerning the war all of which were by necessity heavily myth laden and propagandised. Foremost among these productions was *The First of the Few* which was the biggest grossing film of 1942. In the immediate post war period to start with there were no British aviation war films. The first to be released was *Angels One Five* in 1952. It was well received confirming that the Battle of Britain was a commercial commodity. Over the next few years many famous war heroes published their memoirs or had books written about them including the legless Group Captain Douglas Bader whose story *Reach for the Sky* told by Paul Brickhill became a best seller in 1956. It was followed a year later by the film of the same name which starring Kenneth More dominated that year's box office. The early Battle of Britain films had tended to focus upon the story of individuals not the bigger picture. That changed with the release of the star studded epic *Battle of Britain* in 1969. Using real aircraft the film produced in color and on a far larger scale than had been seen on film before was notable for its spectacular flying sequences. Between the release of *Reach for the Sky* and *Battle of Britain* however much had changed for modern Britain. For a variety of reasons many felt that the story of the nation's pivotal moment in the Second World War was something best buried and forgotten. Indeed the overall box office reaction to *Battle of Britain* reinforced this view all of which might explain why it was the last big screen treatment of this topic for many years. It was during the Battle of Britain's seventieth anniversary year that the subject returned to the nation's screens when Matthew Wightman's docudrama *First Light* was first broadcast. Essentially a serialisation of Spitfire pilot Geoffrey Wellum's best selling memoir of the same title Wightman cleverly combined clips of Wellum as an old man talking about the past with his new drama footage.
