The fourth section of the book has five chapters and provides insights into understanding the nature of the four language skills that is to say listening Chapter 10 speaking Chapter 11 reading Chapter 12 and writing Chapter 13. This section also addresses the issue of assessment with the aim of increasing awareness on the duality teaching assessing and its pedagogical dimension Chapter 14. The book concludes with the fifth section which includes a single chapter that pulls all aforementioned topics together and highlights connections to a student centred approach which involves a reformulation of language teachers teaching practices Chapter 15.

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
