What can music teach a novelist autobiographer or playwright about the art of telling stories The musical play of forms and sounds seems initially to have little to do with the representational function of the traditional narrative genres Yet throughout the modernist era music has been invoked as a model for narrative in its specifically mimetic dimension Although modernist writers may conceive of musical communication in widely divergent ways they have tended to agree on one crucial point that music can help transform narrative into a medium better adapted to the representation of consciousness Eric Prieto studies the twentieth century evolution of this use of music with particular emphasis on the postwar Parisian avant garde For such writers as Samuel Beckett Michel Leiris and Robert Pinget music provides a number of guiding metaphors for the inwardly directed mode of mimesis that Prieto calls listening in where the object of representation is not the outside world but the subtly modulating relations between consciousness and world This kind of semiotic boundary crossing between music and literature is inherently metaphorical but as Prieto's analyses of Beckett Leiris and Pinget show these interart analogies provide valuable clues for bringing to light the unspoken assumptions obscurely understood principles and extra literary aspirations that gave such urgency to the modernist quest to better represent the mind in action *Ethics Lost in Modernity* Matthew Vest,2023-07-21

Ethics Lost in Modernity Reflections on Wittgenstein and Bioethics turns to the philosopher Ludwig Wittgenstein as a guide to understand the immense success yet great danger of bioethics Matthew Vest traces the story of bioethics since its inception in the late 1960s as a way to uncover a number of hidden assumptions within modern ethics that relies upon scientific theorizing as the fundamental way of thinking Autonomy and utilitarianism in particular are two nearly unquestioned goals of scientific theorizing that are easily accessible but at what cost Vest argues that such an ethics enacts a thin moral calculation that runs the risk of enslaving ethics to scientism Far from the depth of religious ethos and practices of virtue modern ethics is lost amidst thin ethical theories enacting a language game that instrumentalizes ethics in service of technological bureaucratic and professional end goals He proposes that true moral living is far from anti

science but rather is envisioned best when ethics and science are balanced with keen insights from ancient sacred cosmology

Meaning in the Arts Louis Arnaud Reid, 2014-02-04 This is Volume II of three in a collection on Aesthetics Originally published in 1969 this volume of the Muirhead library of philosophy After distinguishing and relating the functions of Criticism and Aesthetics in Part I Part II develops the basic thesis of the book which is that the central defining characteristic of the aesthetic is embodiment rather than expression Part III tests this out in examples from the different arts representative and abstract with very special attention to music as an abstract art in which the problem of art's apparently contradictory characters of being both autonomous and yet expressive of life outside art is seen in its most acute form Part IV is a philosophical analysis of the main concepts so far involved meaning symbolism knowledge truth standards in art as distinct from other discursive knowledge It concludes with a discussion of the question whether art is in any sense a revelation Part V considers the bearing of the arguments of the book on aesthetic education
