Stanislavski on Opera Pavel Ivanovich Rumiñantsev, Constantin Stanislavski, Pavel Rummyantsev, 1998 First Published in 1998 Routledge is an imprint of Taylor Francis an informa company *Rediscovering Stanislavsky* Maria Shevtsova, 2020 An interdisciplinary approach to Stanislavsky's theatre practice in sociocultural and political contexts and its legacy in the twenty first century **Constantin Stanislavski** Charlotte Jane Ellerby, 2008 Constantin Stanislavski initially trained as an opera singer before becoming an actor and director In 1918 he was invited to give a series of lectures and workshops on the art of acting in opera at the Moscow Bolshoy Theatre and then he directed a whole series of operas between 1922 and 1932 The opera lectures are found in a book entitled *On the Art of the Stage* and one of the singers in Stanislavski's Opera Studio named Pavel Rummyantsev records Stanislavski's work on individual operas in a book entitled *Stanislavski on Opera* This thesis argues that these lectures are a major contribution to our understanding of Stanislavski's training of the actor they were given before the major acting texts were written or published and they constitute a complete system called *The System and Methods of Creative Art* formed in seven steps of a metaphorical ladder The lectures have received little or no critical attention and this thesis is therefore unique in the light that it sheds upon the relationship between Stanislavski's systems of acting for opera and for theatre and the historical and cultural contexts in which the lectures were given This thesis also challenges the conventional view of Stanislavski as a naturalistic director and posits a binary model which acknowledges his work in fantasy and illusion both in theatre and opera Tzvetan Todorov provides a critical language with which to analyse Stanislavski's approach to operas in the fantastic vein such as Rimsky Korsakov's *A May Night* By contrast Stanislavski's direction of Tchaikovsky's *Eugene Onegin* in 1922 employed a variety of more realist styles Finally this thesis examines Stanislavski's contribution to the movement to create a synthetic theatre at the heart of which is a collective ethos and a desire to unite the words music and action in an organic whole [Stanislavsky and Pedagogy](#) Stefan Aquilina, 2023-07-07 *Stanislavsky and Pedagogy* explores current thinking around the pedagogical implications of Stanislavsky's work The volume depicts the voices of a number of practitioners teachers and scholars who are themselves journeying with Stanislavsky and who in his work find a potent instigator for their own pedagogical practice and study This book outlines instances in which updated interpretations of Stanislavsky's pedagogy are adapted to cater for contemporary needs and scenarios These include the theatre industry new digital technologies the need to develop playfulness application to a broad repertoire performance as pedagogy university managerialism and interdisciplinary crossovers with dance and opera The pedagogies that emerge from these case studies are marked by fluidity and non fixity and help to underscore the malleability of Stanislavsky's system Stanislavsky And is a series of multi perspectival collections that bring the enduring legacy of Stanislavskian actor training into the spotlight of contemporary performance culture making them ideal for students teachers and scholars of acting actor training and directing **Stanislavsky and Place** Jonathan W.
