Studies on Sufism in Central Asia Devin DeWeese,2023-05-31 Studies on Sufism in Central Asia reproduces 12 studies which explore previously unstudied sources with an eye to identifying prominent developments in the social and organizational history of the major Sufi groupings of the region The chronological range reflected in the studies included here runs from the 13th century to the 17th with a somewhat uneven distribution between the earlier half of the period 13th 15th centuries with six articles Nos II IV V VII VIII and XI and the later half 16th 17th centuries with four pieces Nos III IX X XII and two studies Nos I and VI spanning the entire period In terms of specific Sufi traditions the studies included here reflect DeWeese s attention to groups and individuals that might be identified despite the focus of some of his more recent work on questioning the use and meaning of such labels as Kubrav Yasav and Khw jag n Naqshband with four studies focused entirely on Kubrav circles Nos I II V XI five on Yasav subjects Nos III VII IX X XII and one on the Khw jag n No VIII as well as one dealing with Yasav Naqshband relations No VI and another exploring a group that falls outside these labels No IV Khw jag n and Naqshband history has a strong background presence nevertheless in five other articles Nos I III IV VII and IX reflecting the steady rise of the Naqshband ya to predominance among Central Asian Sufi traditions

The first question which arises here is how far it is feasible to study these two poets remote not only in time and space but also in culture, tradition, language and nationality. The key phrase in this topic is Comparative Study. Comparative Literary Study can be defined as an academic field dealing with the study of literature and cultural expressions across linguistic, national and disciplinary boundaries. It performs a role similar to that of the study of international relations but works with languages and artistic traditions to understand cultures from the inside. In short, Comparative Literature is literature without borders. The present comparative study tries to investigate the common Sufi and transcendental elements in Rumi and Whitman and also the former's influence on the latter. Despite geographical, linguistic and historical differences, certain common ideas seem to exist between the two poets and this makes this research on comparative study an interesting one. To compare and examine the Sufi notions, Rumi's *Mathnawi*, *Manavi* and *Divan Shams* and Whitman's *Leaves of Grass* have been considered in this research work. A glance at the previous studies of Rumi and Whitman reveals that the elements of Sufism have been ignored in the poetry of Whitman. In the present study, the following questions have been enquired: What is Sufism? How did it arise? What are its essential features? What is classical Persian Sufi poetry? Who are the masters of classical Persian Sufi poetry and how have they influenced Rumi? How has Sufism influenced both Rumi and Whitman? Has Rumi influenced Whitman? What are the common Sufi elements in Rumi and Whitman? All in all, the mystical thoughts of both poets are so close and because Rumi's mystical thoughts are interpreted in the field of Islamic mysticism, which is Sufism, hence the strong affinity between the two poets has been investigated in terms of Sufi aspect. Evidence represented that Whitman was familiar with Persian poetry and Islamic mysticism and he was inspired by the beauty of Sufi poetry. Both poets considered self-knowledge as the only way for salvation. Rumi and Whitman emphasized the soul of man which is mixed with the Nature of immortality. They believed human eternal love is widespread in all creations. In their idea, annihilation can be achieved by love, which is the most important element of creation.
