Be Collaborative



- Make time to talk, share, and learn with others
- Establish shared goals with others
- Demonstrate respect for differing perspectives
- Value collaborative problem solving

Be Flexible



- Stay open-minded
- Consider new and different ideas
- Change direction or course as needed
- Be willing to take a risk

Be Reflective



- Pause and think about your teaching practices
- Observe and take notes
- Wonder why an activity did or didn't go as planned
- Notice and adapt based on prior experiences
