**The American Slave Narrative and the Victorian Novel** Julia Sun-Joo Lee, 2010-04-09 Conceived as a literary form to aggressively publicize the abolitionist cause in the United States the African American slave narrative remains a powerful and illuminating demonstration of America's dark history Yet the genre's impact extended far beyond the borders of the U S In a period when few books sold more than five hundred copies slave narratives sold in the tens of thousands providing British readers vivid accounts of the violence and privation experienced by American slaves Eloquent bracing narratives by Frederick Douglass William Box Brown Solomon Northrop and others enjoyed unprecedented popularity captivating audiences that included activists journalists and some of the era's greatest novelists *The American Slave Narrative and the Victorian Novel* investigates the shaping influence of the American slave narrative on the Victorian novel in the years between the British Abolition Act and the American Emancipation Proclamation The book argues that Charlotte Brontë W M Thackeray Elizabeth Gaskell Charles Dickens and Fanny and Robert Louis Stevenson integrated into their works generic elements of the slave narrative from the emphasis on literacy as a tool of liberation to the teleological journey from slavery to freedom to the ethics of resistance over submission It contends that Victorian novelists used these tropes in an attempt to access the slave narrative's paradigm of resistance illuminate the transnational dimension of slavery and articulate Britain's role in the global community Through a deft use of disparate sources Lee reveals how the slave narrative becomes part of the textual network of the English novel making visible how black literary as well as economic production contributed to English culture Lucidly written richly researched and cogently argued Julia Sun Joo Lee's insightful monograph makes an invaluable contribution to scholars of American literary history African American literature and the Victorian novel in addition to highlighting the vibrant transatlantic exchange of ideas that illuminated literatures on both sides of the Atlantic during the nineteenth century

**Inventions - Intellectual Property and the Victorian Novel** Clare Pettitt,2004-03-11 Although much has been written about the history of copyright and authorship in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries very little attention has been given to the impact of the development of other kinds of intellectual property on the ways in which writers viewed their work in this period This book is the first to suggest that the fierce debates over patent law and the discussion of invention and inventors in popular texts during the nineteenth century informed the parallel debate over the professional status of authors The book examines the shared rhetoric surrounding the creation of the inventor and the author in the debate of the 1830s and the challenge of the emerging technologies of mass production to traditional ideas of art and industry is addressed in a chapter on authorship at the Great Exhibition of 1851 Subsequent chapters show how novelists Charles Dickens Elizabeth Gaskell and George Eliot participated in debates over the value and ownership of labour in the 1850s such as patent reform and the controversy over married women s property The book shows the ways in which these were reflected in their novels It also suggests that the publication of those novels and the celebrity of their authors had a substantial effect on the subsequent direction of these debates The final chapter shows that Thomas Hardy s later fiction reflects an important shift in thinking about creativity and ownership towards the end of the century Patent Inventions argues that Victorian writers used the novel not just to reflect but also to challenge received notions of intellectual ownership and responsibility It ends by suggesting that detailed study of the debate over intellectual property in the nineteenth century leads to a better understanding of the

The Horrible Gift of Freedom Marcus Wood,2010

Meditations on the paradoxes generated around the ending of western slavery In his tour de force *Blind Memory* Marcus Wood read the visual archive of slavery in eighteenth and nineteenth century America and Britain with a closeness and rigor that until then had been applied only to the written texts of that epoch *Blind Memory* changed the way we look at everything from a Turner seascape to a crude woodcut in a runaway slave advertisement *The Horrible Gift of Freedom* brings the same degree of rigor to an analysis of the visual culture of Atlantic emancipation Wood takes a troubled and troubling look at the iconography inspired by the abolition of slavery across the Atlantic diaspora Why he asks did imagery showing the very instant of the birth of black slave freedom invariably personify Liberty as a white woman Where did the image of the enchained kneeling slave ubiquitous in abolitionist visual culture on both sides of the Atlantic come from And most important why was freedom invariably depicted as a gift from white people to black people In order to assess what the inheritance of emancipation imagery means now and to speculate about where it may travel in the future Wood spends the latter parts of this book looking at the 2007 bicentenary of the 1807 Slave Trade Abolition Act In this context a provocative range of material is analyzed including commemorative postage stamps museum exhibits street performances religious ceremonies political protests and popular film By taking a new look at the role of the visual arts in promoting the great emancipation swindle Wood brings into the open the manner in which the slave power and its inheritors have single mindedly focused on celebratory cultural myths that function to diminish both white culpability and black outrage This book demands that the living lies developed around the memory of the emancipation moment in Europe and America need to be not only reassessed but demolished

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
