

Schleppegrell, 2004-04-26 This book is about how language is used in the context of schooling It demonstrates that the variety of English expected at school differs from the interactional language that students use for social purposes outside of school and provides a linguistic analysis of the challenges of the school curriculum particularly for non native speakers of English speakers of non standard dialects and students who have little exposure to academic language outside of schools The Language of Schooling A Functional Linguistics Perspective builds on current sociolinguistic and discourse analytic studies of language in school but adds a new dimension the framework of

functional linguistic analysis This framework focuses not just on the structure of words and sentences but on how texts are constructed how particular grammatical choices create meanings in the different kinds of texts students are asked to read and write at school The Language of Schooling A Functional Linguistics Perspective provides a functional description of the kinds of texts students are expected to read and write at school relates research from other sociolinguistic and language development perspectives to research from the systemic functional linguistics perspective focuses on the increasing linguistic demands of contexts of advanced literacy middle school through college analyzes the genres typically encountered at school with extensive description of the grammatical features of the expository essay a gatekeeping genre for secondary school graduates reviews the grammatical features of disciplinary genres in science and history and argues for more explicit attention to language in teaching all subjects with a particular focus on what is needed for the development of critical literacy This book will enable researchers and students of language in education to recognize how the grammatical and discourse features of the language of schooling construct the content areas role relationships and purposes and expectations of schools It also will enable them to better understand the nature of language itself and how it emerges from and helps to maintain social structures and institutions and to apply these understandings to creating classroom environments that build on the strengths students bring to school

Hand, 2008 Science Inquiry Argument and Language describes research that has focused on addressing the issue of embedding language practices within science inquiry through the use of the Science Writing Heuristic approach In recent years much attention has been given to two areas of science education scientific argumentation and science literacy The research into scientific argument have adopted different orientations with some focusing on science argument as separate to normal teaching practices that is teaching students about science argument prior to using it in the classroom context while others have focused on embedding science argument as a critical component of the inquiry process The current emphasis on science literacy has emerged because of greater understanding of the role of language in doing and reporting on science Science is not viewed as being separate from language and thus there is emerging research emphasis on how best to improving science teaching and learning through a language perspective Again the research orientations are parallel to the research on scientific argumentation in that the focus is generally between instruction separate to practice as opposed to embedding language practices within the science classroom context **The Translator**, 2006 [Essays in the Study of Scientific Discourse](#) John T.
