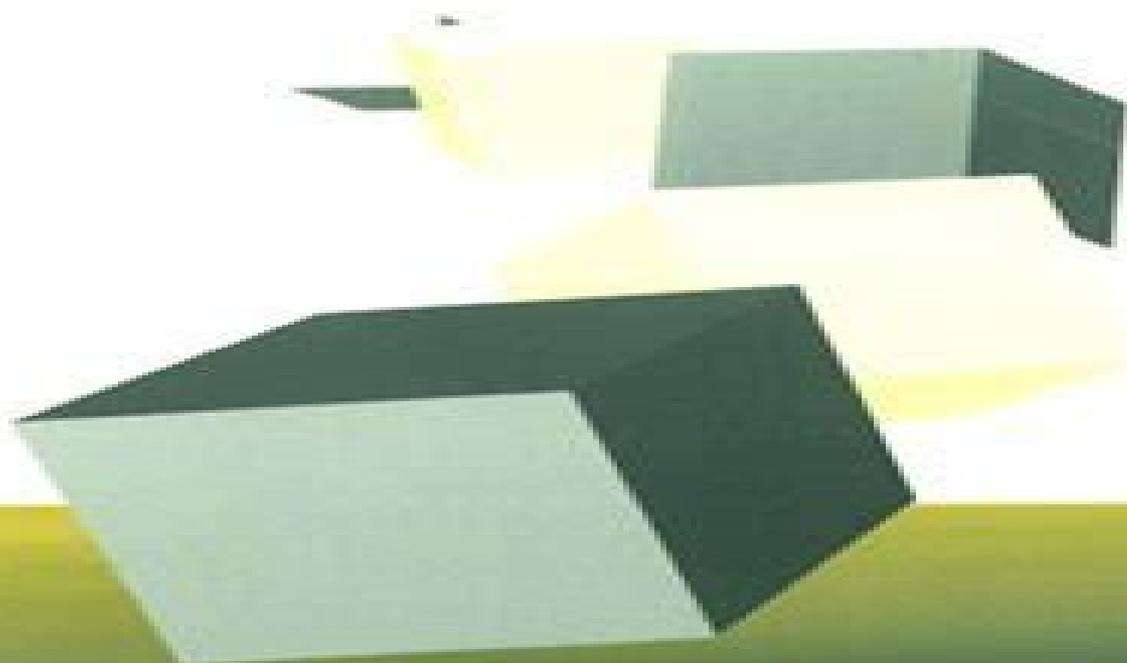

The Diverse Student Perspective on Standards-Based Learning Alison Aardappel, 2019 The purpose of this study is to examine the perceptions of a diverse student population on the impact that standards based grading has on learning The participants were seventy three ninth grade students in a large public comprehensive high school in Southern California and ten teachers who have shifted from traditional grading to standards based grading practices All students were asked to answer questions on a scaled response survey about both traditional and standards based grading practices All ten teachers were interviewed with open ended questions The data was analyzed and compared to data found in the literature to determine the need to shift to more equitable grading practices Ultimately all students including English learners students with disabilities and students who are socioeconomically disadvantaged agreed that standards based grading is accurate and promotes learning through regular revisions and clear objectives at a higher rate than traditional grading practices do All ten teachers acknowledged the advantages and disadvantages of both systems but prefer standards based grading because of the direct benefits to all students I believe that every high school educator should be working toward shifting to a standards based model to provide equity in grading for all their students
