

The Ultimate Beginner's Guide to Writing Essays

- 1. Decide what topic you'll be focusing on.**
Ask yourself if you want the topic to be a general overview or a major analysis.
- 2. Create an outline or a diagram for your ideas.**
It is important that you are able to organize your thoughts effectively by putting it all onto paper.
- 3. Write a thesis statement.**
The first part of the thesis statement should be all about introducing your topic while the second part should tell the point of the essay.
- 4. Write the body.**
The body contains three major parts: the main point, sub points, and the elaboration of the sub points.



- 5. Work on the introduction.**
Your introduction should be engaging and must show the focus of the essay.
- 6. Write the conclusion.**
You need to sum up the overall idea while adding a final perspective on the topic.
- 7. Review and edit.**
Use www.grammarcheck.net to proofread your essay. Pay attention to the paragraphs and check the entirety of the essay. If you see any errors or areas that need improvement, make sure to edit those parts.

What You Need to Avoid When Writing Essays

- “I”**: Using the word “I” limits your essay's perspective. It makes your essay appear less mature.
- Logical Fallacies**: You should avoid saying something that is false or taking in evidence if you truly want to strengthen your argument.
- Slang**: If you use slang in your writing, your work will appear unintelligent to the reader. There are more sophisticated words in the English language that you can use.
- Going Off into a Tangent**: Make sure that you write only refined thoughts and not just something that would keep the reader going.
- Over-dramatization**: There are times when writers exaggerate a sentence. Usually, one should only make the writer look unprofessional and immature.
- “Wanna”**: A good example of a contraction is the word “wanna,” which is a “want to.” Contractions make an essay look dull, so you should avoid this at all times.
- Making Assumptions**: Even with something that might seem as common knowledge, you should never assume anything that is assuming.

The Components of an Effective Essay

- Thesis**: Its main role is to introduce the topic while maintaining the element of argument.
A successful essay should always contain a problem, preferably one that is of a current issue. This would help attract readers to read your essay.
- Evidence**: Your essay should always contain evidence of your arguments. This should have to be the material that you are working with. This is important because it helps you prove the thesis.
This is how the writer turns the evidence into argument as well as explaining how the evidence supports the thesis.
- Analysis**: This should flow in a logical way. The readers should be able to understand the essay and how each section extends the arguments while preparing them for the arguments to come.

How to Write the Conclusion

A writer needs to keep in mind that the conclusion is often what a reader will remember best. Your conclusion should be the best part of your paper.

- Stress the importance of the thesis statement.
- Give the reader a sense of completion.
- Leave a final impression on the reader.

SUGGESTIONS

- Answer the question “so what?”**
Show your readers why this paper was important.
- Synthesize, don't summarize.**
Show the reader how the points you made and the support and examples you used were not random, but fit together.
- Redirect your readers.**
Give your reader something to think about, perhaps a way to use your paper in the real world. Think globally.
- Create a new meaning.**
By demonstrating how your ideas work together, you can create a new picture. Often, the sum of the paper is worth more than its parts.

STRATEGIES

- Echoing the introduction**: Echoing your introduction can be a good strategy if it is meant to bring the reader full circle.
- Exaggerating the reader's response**: By exaggerating the reader's response to your paper, you are helping them to redirect the information in the paper, and they may apply it to their own lives.
- Looking to the future**: Looking to the future can emphasize the importance of your paper or readers' response to your paper. It may help them apply the new information to their lives or see things more clearly.
- Posing questions**: Posing questions, either to your readers or in general, may help your readers gain a new perspective on the topic, which they may not have held before reading your conclusion.
