Her mother is dead and her wayward father is gone. Perplexed by a new aloofness in Chirstie, Wully soon discovers that she has been raped and is pregnant. To the shock of his parents and the tight knit Scottish community in which they live, he marries Chirstie and claims the child and the shame of its early birth as his own. But the lingering presence of Chirstie's attacker sets in motion a series of events that pit the desire for revenge against a reluctance to perpetuate the cycle of violence. Often compared to Willa Cather's *One of Ours* and Edna Ferber's *So Big* for its earthy realism, its portrait of an immigrant community and its depiction of Midwestern farm life, Margaret Wilson's provocative debut novel, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for 1924, is ripe for rediscovery. In a recent reappraisal, Judy Cornes commends the novel's feeling for time and place, a sense of the unrelenting forces that both history and nature impose on the individual. *The Able McLaughlins* remains an engrossing story with characters who constantly engage our attention.

Set among Scottish Presbyterian homesteaders on the Iowa prairie during the Civil War, *The Able McLaughlins* follows Wully McLaughlin and Christie McNair as a private calamity collides with public codes of honor. Wilson's prose is spare and exacting; its regional realism is tempered by tender domestic detail and moral intensity. In the lineage of Midwestern regionalists such as Willa Cather and Hamlin Garland, the novel probes secrecy, justice, and communal belonging, earning the 1924 Pulitzer Prize for its clear-eyed portrait of immigrant endurance and covenant faith. Margaret Wilson, an Iowa-born writer steeped in Presbyterian discipline and the stories of Scottish settler families, channels intimate knowledge of church governance, kinship, and prairie labor into her narrative. Drawing on oral history and local memory and on a keen eye for social ethics, she shapes a drama that feels both ethnographic and unsentimentally humane. The novel's authority springs from lived textures rather than polemic; a craft she extended in the sequel *The Law and the McLaughlins*. Recommended to readers of Cather and Garland to

[Margaret Wilson - The Able McLaughlins](#) Margaret Wilhelmina,2020-09-22 Margaret Wilhelmina Wilson was born on the 16th January 1882 in Traer Iowa Her early years were spent on the family farm before she enrolled at the University of Chicago and obtained degrees in 1903 1904 On graduating she became a missionary for the United Presbyterian Church of North America and was sent to the Punjab in India to work at a girl s school and then a hospital Illness meant a return home in 1910 She would spend the next few years at the divinity school of The University of Chicago and to teach at West Pullman High School She also took care of her invalided father and wrote a number of short stories which were published in various magazines including the Atlantic Monthly Many of these explored the role of religion and the secondary status of women in society In 1923 she won a 2000 writing prize offered by Harper Brothers That same year she married George Douglas Turner who she had met in India 19 years before Turner was a tutor at Brasenose College Oxford and later the warden of Dartmoor Prison She was now to live in England In 1924 she was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for her novel The Able McLaughlins She continued to write using in various novels her experiences of all those years before in India and to continue to explore women s role in society although at times her critics were apt to label her work as melodramatic Her interest in penal reform provoked a non fiction study The Crime of Punishment 1931 and also influenced two of her eight adult novels The Dark Duty 1931 and The Valiant Wife 1933 Her final work was a children s book The Devon Treasure Mystery 1939 Margaret Wilhelmina Wilson died on the 6th October 6 1973 **The Family** ,1923 **The University of Chicago Magazine** ,1922 [Film Year Book](#) ,1925 **West Virginia Legislative Hand Book and Manual and Official Register** ,1928 **Correct English** ,1913 **The Bookman** ,1927 **The Spectator** ,1923 A weekly review of politics literature theology and art [The Forum](#) ,1925 [The Open Shelf](#) ,1919 [Reading Abridgments of Contemporary Novels](#)
