Germany's most successful writer of prose fiction was born in 1875 and died in 1955. He was awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1929. These two stories from Mann's middle period concern major problems facing Germany between the wars: the first deals with the chaos of economic, social, and moral values in the early twenties, and the second with the enslavement of a society by a fanatical and hypnotic dictator. In both pieces, Mann's moral values are delicately pointed by his omnipresent irony.

Buddenbrooks Thomas Mann, 2011-05-25 A Major Literary Event: a brilliant new translation of Thomas Mann's first great novel, one of the two for which he was awarded the Nobel Prize in literature in 1929. *Buddenbrooks* first published in Germany in 1900 when Mann was only twenty-five, has become a classic of modern literature: the story of four generations of a wealthy bourgeois family in northern Germany. Judged as the greatest of Mann's novels by some critics, it is ranked as among the greatest by all. Thomas Mann was awarded the Nobel Prize for literature in 1929.
