Sistine Chapel:

Two decades later, Michelangelo returned to paint *The Last Judgement*, which covers the wall behind the altar. Michelangelo's revolutionary work departed radically from tradition and marked a turning point in the history of Western art. Antonio Forcellino brings to life the wonders of the Sistine Chapel by describing the aims and everyday practices of the protagonists who envisioned it and the artists who created it.
