introduction on how to flex their imaginations and put it down on paper but to also put it all together for this book No matter your age seeing your writing on the printed page is a thrill Perhaps that thrill is greatest for the youngest of writers as they feel acknowledged and proud of their work and the fact that someone has decided it s good enough to share with the rest of the world The talent and imagination of young people is a joy to see and encourage They have clever fictional stories to tell touching personal stories to share and voices that should be heard As teachers we can give children the tools and skills to become writers but the more challenging step of helping them discover the writer within is that creative leap only they can make
